SCHOOL ACTIVITIES AS RELATED TO RELIGIOUS HOLIDAYS

Holidays throughout the school year should be recognized for their educational value in the District's schools. The staff should be aware of and sensitive to the diverse religious and cultural backgrounds of

the children in the community. The purpose of this policy is to promote mutual understanding and

respect for the many beliefs and customs stemming from our community's religious, racial ethnic and

cultural heritage.

The North Merrick Board remains impartial with regard to religion and seeks neither to advance nor

inhibit religion. Students, faculty and administration are reminded of the pluralism of religious beliefs

and are urged to be conscious of and respect the sensitivities of others.

Curriculum Based Lessons/Units

Activities related to the observance of holidays are to be conducted in an unbiased and objective

manner. Holiday study should be used as a vehicle to encourage students to learn more about the

beliefs of various religions and cultures, thus educating students about the need for tolerating and accepting others' religious views and/or cultural practices.

The New York state grade level social studies curriculum should be utilized as a guideline for the extent

and depth of lesson and unit development in this area.

Religious Music

Religious music relevant to the curriculum may be included as part of an educational program within the

classroom setting. Songs stemming from religious worship or which are liturgical in nature shall not be

performed.

Holiday programs may include music representation of the season which does not promulgate the

tenets of any particular religion. The purpose of these programs is to foster enjoyment, understanding and feelings in order to promote better interpersonal relationships and express the various social and

cultural aspects of the holiday season.

Decorations

Schools shall be permitted to use decorations which are secular and seasonal in nature and do not have

any religious connotations. Attention should be given to creating an environment where a child's beliefs are respected and appreciated. Christmas Trees and Menorahs, as well as secular symbols of other

cultures, may be displayed. A balance should be maintained.
